## PUBLIC MEETING MINUTES BALDWIN HILLS CONSERVANCY

#### Friday, September 19, 2014

#### I. Call to Order

A public meeting of the Baldwin Hills Conservancy (BHC) was assembled at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, September 19, 2014, at the Kenneth Hahn State Recreation Area, Community Center located at 4100 South La Cienega Boulevard, Los Angeles, CA 90056.

#### II. Roll Call

**Members Present: Voting** - Julie Alvis, Lloyd Dixon, Karen Finn, Yolanda Gorman (arrived after roll call,) Robert Jones (arrived after all voting had been conducted,) Karly Katona, Craig Sap, Chair Starlett Quarles, Russ Guiney, **Non-voting** - Vice Chair Sara Amir, Jason Marshall, and Marina Voskanian. **Staff Present:** David McNeill, Executive Officer; Gail Krippner, Grant Program Manager; Avril LaBelle, Executive Secretary.

#### III. Approval of Minutes (July) - Starlett Quarles, Chair

The Chair called for a motion to approve the (July) minutes. Member Dixon made a motion to approve, Member Sap seconded the motion, and a roll call vote was taken – **7 ayes, 0 nays, 1 abstention, Minutes approved.** 

#### IV. Public Comments - Starlett Quarles, Chair

Public comment was invited. Mr. Robert Cole, President of the Baldwin Hills Estates Homeowners Association, and member of LA County Citizens' Economy and Efficiency Commission provided comment. Mr. Cole thanked the board on behalf of the Homeowners Association for partnering in support of improvements to a parcel of land on Don Alberto drive. He commented that the clean-up and improvement to that property boosted community morale. Because of the heightened morale homeowners are returning to the community, and even rallied in support of area traffic cameras.

### V. Presentation on the 2014 La Brea Corridor Planning Study - Michelle Montano, Project Manager, North East Trees

Project Manager Michelle Montano gave an informative presentation on The La Brea Planning Study. Presentation slides covered:

**Park Access** – existing and proposed auto, pedestrian, bicycle, and public transportation; **Neighborhood Connections** – push-button signal/crosswalk, LADWP service road, utility corridor, and prefabricated pedestrian bridge;

Issues – Concerns – Interventions – Safety, sidewalks, lights, parking, trails; bike infrastructure, green alleys, improved crossings, utility corridor trail, storm water BMPs;

Outreach – Blog, Facebook, Twitter, Survey Monkey – Surveys, presentations and workshops;

Mr. McNeill added -This planning grant was issued by the California Resources Agency, Strategic Growth Council and the final product will be a public document. Several items being proposed are in line with the Baldwin Hills Park Master Plan. We will be open to grant applications from any agency whether city, county, or non-profit for implementation. This is an opportunity for improvements in the northern area of La Brea over the next few years.

VI. Discussion and Possible Action on an Amendment to the Performance Period for the Stocker Corridor Segment of Park to Pla ya, Agreement #BHC12005 with the Mountains Recreation Conservation Authority (MCRA) – David McNeill, Executive Officer

Mr. McNeill – The MRCA is in charge of implementing Stocker Corridor, the most eastern link in the Park to Playa project leading to the ocean. They have experienced delays with CEQA and permitting at present. It is anticipated those issues will be resolved by the end of this month, with construction beginning in November. Based on that, the contract will require an extension. Completion of the park was slated for December of 2014, and will now be completed December of 2015. There is no effect to the budget.

The Chair called for a motion. Member Katona made the motion, Member Dixon seconded the motion, and a roll call vote was taken – 8 ayes, 0 nays, 0 Abstention, Agenda Item 6 approved.

VII. Discussion and Possibl e Actio n on Resolutions in Support of Propos ition 1, the Water Quality, Supply, and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014, and SB 1086 (De Leon), the Safe Neighborhood Parks, Rivers and Coastal Protection Act of 2014.

Mr. McNeill provided information on Proposition 1, a 7.5 billion dollar bond that will be on the statewide ballot this November 4<sup>th</sup>. If approved it would provide 7.54 billion for improvements in and around the watersheds impacting water quality, water preservation, and water supply. Line items include: \$520 million - improve water quality for beneficial use; \$1.495 billion - competitive grants, multi-benefit eco-systems, watershed protection, restoration projects; \$810 million - expenditures on competitive grants and loans; innovative regional water management plans; \$2.7 billion - water storage, dams and reservoirs; \$725 million - water recycling and advanced water treatment; \$395 million - statewide flood managements and activities, and \$10 million - protection and preservation (§79730 of statute.)

Mr. McNeill emphasized that we are not an advocacy group as we are here to provide education and information. Board Members recommended that there be no resolution making it unnecessary to take action.

The Board determined there is no resolution, and no action was taken on Agenda Item 7.

#### VIII. Executive Officer Report - David McNeill, Executive Officer

#### **Project Status Update**

**Norman O. Houston Park** - Reopening is at 11:30 today and the park looks great.

**Milton Street Park** - We are working in partnership with the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority. Construction began in August. The shade structure adjustments and bird watching mound are in a zoning hearing for variance. Those two items are outside of the current scope of approved construction. These items are being further vetted, and mitigations are being worked through. Construction is on schedule.

**Stoneview N ature Center** - LA County Parks and Recreation is working on Stoneview. Design build evaluations were received in August, and the Board of Supervisors is expected to award mid-October. Member Katona added that the Board of Supervisors did award a demolition contract. Demolition of existing facilities is set to begin this month.

**Scenic Ov erlook** - The pedestrian path — Culver City is asking to amend the project schedule because the bid package required more time than anticipated and the timeline for construction has been pushed back to avoid the rainy season.

**LMU Study** – The university has hired a cadre of research students to conduct this survey and data collection has begun.

**USC Wildlife Sur veys** – Surveys are continuing, and have covered Stocker Corridor, Culver City Park, Ballona Creek, and Kenneth Hahn. Five camera traps were installed in Kenneth Hahn. Access was approved by Freeport McMoRan for the 100 acre Inglewood Hills oil drilling area.

#### Fiscal Update

Expenditure report by fund - Attachment #2 lists all remaining appropriations for support as well as Capital Outlay and Local Assistance. We have some appropriations that did not get properly submitted for reappropriation, and were not made unaware until after the budgets were approved.

All existing projects are fully encumbered and have funds available; however, we have no appropriations for new Prop 40 projects until next July. We have a live \$3 million plus Proposition 84 appropriation that was submitted and approved during the budget process. We can work in collaboration with our partners during the interim if an urgent need for funds should arise. Budget Change Proposals have already been submitted for next year, and I anticipate success regarding the re-appropriation approvals. (See Attachment #3 Bond Cash Funds.)

#### X. Board Member Announcements or Proposed Agenda Items for Future Meetings

The Board wishes to recognize and welcome special guest and former Senator Kevin Murray.

Member Guiney provided information on Proposition P - a continuation of funding which is part of Proposition A, approved by voters in 1992 and set to expire June 2015. Proposition P continues a \$54 million/year funding via a flat \$23/parcel; has widely distributed funds throughout the county, cities, beaches & harbors, county parks, some to the state; and will benefit underserved areas that do not have parks or meet the minimum standards. A specific amount would also go to cities, clean water projects, regional open space and non-profit agencies for use on like projects, can be used for planning projects, and also covers maintenance. It is up to the voters to decide.

Member Katona – We are renovating the shade structures at Kenneth Hahn Park; early next year we will begin Park to Playa trail connections in Kenneth Hahn Park; Stoneview construction begins summer 2015; we are continuing with improvements on Slauson. Welcome Lacy Johnson. Lacy has joined the 2<sup>nd</sup> district team and will be working with me on a number of environmental and transportation issues.

Member Sap – The Angeles District lost a historic lifeguard facility and 13 pier pilings in the recent hurricane. We have plans to replace the pilings in the off season. Attendance it up and the integrity of the pier is intact.

Member Voskanian – State Lands Commission is conducting a Symposium in Long Beach, October 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup>. Jason Marshall will is also be is speaking at the Symposium.

**Re: Item 5:** Discussion and possible action on an amendment to the Milton Street Park agreement #BHC12000 with the Mountains Recreation Conservation Authority

<u>Recommendation:</u> Staff recommends adopting resolution 14-08 authorizing the Executive Officer to amend Agreement #BHC12000 with the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA)

Background: The MRCA is seeking multiple line item shifts to the Milton Street Park Project budget (see Attachment #1). Under the original budget, cost estimates for construction management and implementation had not been developed to bid level detail. Upon completion of the final construction documents and award of the project to a construction firm, a re-configuration of the budget and tasks was required to allow for proper tracking and monitoring of project activities. Overall, the three major task amounts set in the original proposal, 1) Project Design/Project Management; 2) Permitting Bidding; and 3) Construction, did not change dramatically. Each task remains within a 10% threshold of the original budget. On the attachment breakdown (see attachment #2) there are detailed costs identified showing new budget line items as well as existing items where the BHC contribution increased or decreased to balance out the project task.

If the amendment is approved, the revised budget spreadsheet (see Attachment #3) would replace the budget in the original agreement. The MRCA maintains that no budget augmentation is required and that the scope and deliverables will not be impacted by this request.

> Budget Amendment Request – Ballona Creek – Milton Street Park Agreement Number: BHC 12000

Dear Mr. McNeill:

The Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) respectfully submits a request for an amendment to the project budget for the above-referenced grant.

The requested budget amendment is necessary because the previously submitted project budget amounts were based on MRCA's, landscape consultants (SWA's), and construction management consultant (TCM's) best construction estimates based on the final construction documents.

As the project has been bid out and a contractor is now on board, MRCA is able to provide updated and more accurate costs that are based on the hired Contractors schedule of values / costs to construct the park and green street.

The total budgeted Task 1 (Planning, Design and Project Management) overall category cost has increased by \$60,291 due to a lengthy permitting review period which increased project management costs. However, the total BHC contribution towards that task has only increased by \$6,028 – less than ten percent (10%) of the original contribution. This amount was funded through the reallocation of funds from the Task 2 (Permitting, Bidding, etc.) category.

The total budgeted Task 2 (Permitting, Bidding, etc.) category cost decreased largely due to actual costs for plan check/permit fees for the green street being lower than estimated. Therefore, the BHC contribution for this task has ultimately decreased by \$19,617. \$13,589 of this decreased contribution has been reallocated to Task 3 (Construction) with \$6,028 going to Task 1 (as described above).

As indicated above, Task 3 (Construction) category cost and BHC contribution has increased by \$13,589 as a result of the expenses for Construction Management and Construction Consultation line items totaling more than anticipated. This is combined with General Contractor's construction cost (schedule of values) averaging less than anticipated for the park but more than anticipated for the green street. The revised budget now reflects actual contract amounts.

We feel that this revised budget will make it easier to track the invoicing during construction as the Contractor will be billing according to the provided schedule of values.

**Re: Item 6:** Consideration of an amendment to the performance period for Hetzler Road Pedestrian Trail Project at Baldwin Hills Scenic Overlook, Agreement #BHC13003 with Culver City.

<u>Recommendation:</u> Approve resolution 14-09 authorizing a 12-month extension of the Performance Period for the Hetzler Road Pedestrian Trail Project.

#### **Background:**

The Governing Board approved Resolution 14-09 in January 2013, authorizing a grant of up to \$791,000 in BHC Prop 84 funds to the City of Culver City for the Hetzler Road Pedestrian Trail Project at the Baldwin Hills Scenic Overlook.

Per the enclosed letter, (see attachment #1) Culver City Public Works has requested a 12-month extension for the performance period of the grant. If approved original project timeline would be replaced with the amended version (see attachment #2) and the project would be completed by November 2015.

During this spring, final construction bid documents were created by the grantee for access improvements to address ongoing conflicts between pedestrians and vehicles as they enter and exit the primary road to the popular park. Unfortunately, the bids process was delayed due to several plan revisions and ADA review by the State. Once a contractor was selected, the timeline for construction had shifted several months entering the rainy season beginning October 2014 through April 2015. While considering the new project start date, Culver City Public Works staff cited serious concerns about erosion during construction. The construction of the trail requires cutting into a steep hillside and building retaining walls which could be problematic if rain occurs making it advisable to postpone construction until spring. Accordingly, the grantee has made a request for the construction start date to be postponed to spring 2015 and project delivery in the late fall.

The purpose of this letter is to request an amendment from the Baldwin Hills Conservancy to the grant agreement for the Hetzler Road Pedestrian Trail project.

Due to serious concerns with construction of the project occurring during the rainy season (October 15 through April 15), the project was postponed until spring 2015. Given the steep hillside and that the construction entails disturbing this hillside by cutting into it to construct a path and retaining walls, there are substantial risks of erosion problems if rain occurs. Based on the change to the project start date, an updated project schedule is attached to amend the executed grant agreement between the City of Culver City and the Baldwin Hills Conservancy.

**Recommendation:** No Action Required

<u>Background:</u> In follow up to the May presentation on the Park to Playa Trail (P2P), staff is providing the latest versions of the alignments and start dates proposed for the ongoing development of the P2P trail (Power Point to be provided).

- The Stocker Corridor Segment has been updated to include security gates the parking lot as well as fencing and a gate at the stair access to Ruben Ingold Park. Project construction will begin next month.
- The Blair Hills Corridor Segment has been realigned to address neighbor concerns about the proximity to their homes. A larger, approximately 50 to 75 foot buffer, was achieved through negotiations with Freeport McMoRan and Culver City. Several switch backs will be required due to the topography. Final plans will be sent for approval by the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority this quarter.
- The Kenneth Hahn State Recreation Area (KHSRA) Segment, the County is currently working on their grant agreement for the Federal Recreational Trails Program funds and are planning to start construction on the KHSRA improvements sometime in early 2015.

- 6. A member shall hold each of the two offices for no more than one year; re-election may occur beginning the third year out of office.

7. Term of office shall be January to December.

#### Process

- 1. Vice Chair rotates to Chair; Chair becomes Past Chair.
- 2. New Vice Chair elected.
- 3. Current Chair, Vice Chair and Past Chair are committee to nominate next Vice Chair.
- a. Vice Chair selection should recognize diversity and expertise.
- b. Selection made to achieve a different perspective/representation than previously.

#### **Rationale**

- 1. Compatible with Publication 32558, the Resources Code.
- 2. Adds structure and forethought to current process.
- 3. Allows members to express their interest in being Vice Chair one month prior to the actual vote (instead of announcing interest at the meeting in which the votes are taken).
- 4. Committee to survey eligible members for interest and expertise, and recommend candidates for whom Board votes.
- 5. Gives Vice Chair experience prior to elevation to Chair.
