PUBLIC MEETING MINUTES BALDWIN HILLS CONSERVANCY Friday, July 2, 2021

David Edsall Jr., Deputy Attorney General, conducted the swearing in of Laura Muraida.

10:00 a.m. Call to Order - A public meeting of the Baldwin Hills Conservancy (BHC) was assembled at 10:01 a.m. on Friday, July 2, 2021 via teleconference Pursuant to Executive Order N-29-20 issued by Governor Gavin Newsom on March 17, 2020.

I. Roll Call – David McNeill, BHC Staff

II. Approval of Minutes (February) – Dr. Raissa White, Chair

Member Gorman provided a motion to approve the minutes unanimously. Member Ntuk seconded the motion. There being no objections or questions, the Chair called for any objections to the approval of the minutes. With no objections, the minutes were approved. Introduction of Laura Muraida, who will represent Supervisor Holly Mitchell's office. She spoke about the office priorities, such as urban green space equality and conservation. Issues that affect the local community.

III. Public Comments - Dr. Raissa White, Chair

There were no comments.

IV. Message from the Chair – Dr. Raissa White, Chair

The chair looks forward to the rest of the year and possibly being able to have an in-person meeting. She is grateful to be here and looks forward to the future work of the conservancy.

V. Update on the Kenneth Hahn Recycled Water Lateral EIR – Interim Director EJ Caldwell – West Basin Metropolitan Water District

Interim Director EJ Caldwell gave background about who the West Basin Metropolitan Water District serves. They discussed the feasibility study for the Kenneth Hahn Lateral Project that has already been completed and the next steps in the process for bringing purple pipe to the region.

VI. Update on the La Brea/La Cienega Greening Study – Senior Program Manager Anna Apostolos – Los Angeles Neighborhood Initiative

Jeff Hutchins from Webb and Associates gave an overview of the steering committee plans. The plans include stormwater cleaning, low energy consumption, air quality improvements, adequate pedestrian circulation, and beautification. Member Muraida asked what groups were included in this committee. David responded that members from several Homeowners Associates were asked, but only some

decided to participate. Anna Apostolos and David will send information to Member Muraida. Natalie Hernandez of Climate Resolve commented that several parts of the project align with what they are doing for the resilience planning effort and asked for Anna's contact information to collaborate. Liz Gosnell asked about if there were any studies on the number of cars on La Cienega. Jeff Hutchins responded that there was no study conducted.

VII. Update on the Baldwin Hills Parklands Community Resilience and Access Plan - Associate Director Natalie Hernandez - Climate Resolve

Natalie Hernandez from Climate and April Sandifer from Slate Z spoke about developing and inclusive community resilience and access plan for the Baldwin Hills Parklands. The 18-month project's goal is for the park to become an enhanced resource by increasing service and programming. The plan also includes designing resilience hubs.

VIII. Executive Officer Report: Legislative, Project Status, and Fiscal updates – BHC Staff Representatives

Project status updates were given by Gail Krippner. She discussed the completion of the La Cienega Pedestrian Bridge and The Baldwin Hills Scenic Overlook Trail and Stormwater Improvement Project. The water capture at Yvonne B. Burke sports complex, the construction will start in the next few months. The Community Greening Plan and Greenway Design from KDI recently had a community workshop on May 11 to discuss the process with community members. The Community Resilience and Access Plan by Climate Resolve just had a community meeting that was well attended by members of the local community. A newly signed contract, HoneyLove, will soon be added to the expanding project list once the County finishes up their final approval.

IX. Board Member Announcements or Proposed Agenda Items for Future Meetings

Member Rascon commented she will send David McNeill a relevant article regarding abandoned oil well and fields in and around the Los Angeles area and the contributing factors to climate change.

Chair White thanked David, Gail, and Tiffany for their hard work at the Conservancy, welcomed new Member Laura Muraida, and thanked the presenters for informing the board about information that pertains to the Parklands.

Background: The Nomination Committee is preparing to consider candidates to fill the 2021-2022 Vice Chair position. Eligible candidates will be selected from the attached list based on the protocol below adopted by the Governing Board in 2003. The Committee will present the final list of nominees for election at the upcoming Conservancy meeting.

Officer Nominations Procedure

- 1. The Nominating Committee shall be an annual committee.
- 2. The outgoing BHC Board Chair shall become the Chair of the Nominating Committee. Two other members shall be volunteers.
- 3. The Board Vice Chair shall rotate as the next Board Chair.
- 4. Nominees for office shall be selected for diversity of background and experience different than previous Chairs, and for having previously served as a committee chair person.
- 5. The Nominating Committee will recommend one or two candidates for Chair; voting Board members may nominate others at the time of election. The candidate with the highest number of votes shall be declared the winner.
- 6. A member shall hold each of the two offices for no more than one year; re-election may occur beginning the third year out of office.
- 7. Term of office shall be January to December.

Chair and Vice Chair Annual Elections

Process

- 1. Vice Chair rotates to Chair; Chair becomes Past Chair.

 - a. Vice Chair selection should recognize diversity and expertise.
 - b. Selection made to achieve a different perspective/representation than previously.

Rationale

- 1. Compatible with Section 32558 of the Public Resources Code.
- 2. Adds structure and forethought to current process.
- 3. Allows members to express their interest in being Vice Chair one month prior to the actual vote (instead of announcing interest at the meeting in which the votes are taken.)
- 4. Committee to survey eligible members for interest and expertise, and recommend candidates for whom Board votes.
- 5. Gives Vice Chair experience prior to elevation to Chair.

Recommendation: Discussion item only. No action required at this time.

Background: The <u>Baldwin Hills Recreation and Conservation Authority</u> is a Joint Powers Authority established in 2000. The Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy (SMMC) joined the County of Los Angeles to form the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority (BHRCA). The mission of BHRCA is to acquire, expand and improve open space within the Baldwin Hills and Ballona Creek, and other natural and recreational areas in the Second Supervisorial District of the County of Los Angeles.

Current BHRCA board members include: Hon. Holly J. Mitchell, Chairperson, Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors; Laura Muraida, Designee of Chairperson; Norma Garcia, Designee of Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation; and William Vanderberg, Public Member Appointed by the Chairperson.

Over the last twenty one years, the SMMC has applied its vast expertise in land acquisition and preservation to assist the County of Los Angeles in creating muchneeded recreational areas in the heart of Los Angeles. They have also used staffing from the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority to handle invoicing, receipts, contracts, and annual reporting. Transitioning the BHC into the JPA could provide benefits including greater flexibility in carrying out the BHC's work beyond the constraints of its existing statutory structure.

JPA's generally require either monetary or in-kind staff contributions from member entities. Local agencies can contribute program money and a budget for administrative staff, the conservancies can contribute staff time as well. Joining the JPA may add to BHC's workload and additional staff would have to be contracted through agreements with other departments or agencies.

Discussions to advance the drafting of an amendment, as well as review current agreements to assess potential liabilities are currently taking place. Once vetted, a proposed amendment would be put before the governing boards of the L.A. County Supervisors, SMMC and BHC for consideration.

Background: In May 2020, the Governing Board approved Resolution 20-05 authorizing a grant of up to \$359,810 in BHC Proposition 68 Local Assistance Funds to Kounkuey Design Initiative (KDI) for the Mar Vista Community Greening Plan and Greenway Design Project.

The project includes a community-driven design development process centered on the Mar Vista Gardens (MVG) site owned by the Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles. Opportunities for greening of public community space, alleys and neighboring streets, pathways as well as public access to the Ballona Creek Trail and surrounding park amenities will be included in the plan.

The deliverables will include a report with cost estimates for up to two Priority Design Concepts along with future Community Programs and a Stewardship Plan.

Additional work product includes identifying potential developers as well as operation and maintenance partners for future project implementation. Lastly, experiential learning materials for adults and high-school students to be educated about stormwater dynamics and climate change adaptation would be published for circulation to area residents and stakeholders.

The community engagement activities center on stakeholder input by the facilitation of Youth and Resident focus groups drawing participants from the Boys and Girls Club as well as the MVG Resident Advisory Council.

To date, these activities have included regular meetings, both virtual and in-person of each focus group. The presentation will describe the process and input received.

Legislative Update

<u>SB 170</u> Skinner - On September 15th the Budget Act of 2021 (Trailer) was enrolled by the Legislature and presented to the Governor for consideration. If approved by the Governor, the Bill would appropriate \$1.3 million in General Funds to the Baldwin Hills Conservancy for climate resilience, community access, wildfire prevention and natural resource protection.

Motion by Supervisor's Holly Mitchell and Sheila Kuehl to end oil drilling in Unincorporated Los Angeles County was unanimously approved by the Board of Supervisors on September 15, 2021. This action seeks to address climate change, environmental justice and public health consistent with current State leadership's goals. County Departments of Regional Planning, Public Health, the Office of Oil and Gas and the Chief Sustainability Office will proactively plan for a long-term just transition strategy to phase out oil drilling in unincorporated Los Angeles County.

Motion by Supervisor's Holly Mitchell and Janice Hahn was unanimously approved by the Board of Supervisors on September 15, 2021. The action seeks to address capping

and plugging idle oil wells, remediating sites and returning lands to uses that are beneficial to local communities. County Departments of Regional Planning, Public Health, Fire and HazMat, the Office of Oil and Gas and the Chief Sustainability Office will work with the CA Geological Energy Management Division to explore revenue sources to support enhanced enforcement, public health response, and site remediation activities; while at the same time, take steps to develop a framework for an Oil Well Cleanup Pilot Program.
