10:00 a.m. Call to Order - A public meeting of the Baldwin Hills Conservancy (BHC) was assembled at 10:02 a.m. on Friday, December 16, 2022, via a hybrid format.

I. II. Public Comments – Megan Cooper, Chair

There were no public comments.

II. Roll Call – David McNeil, BHC Staff

Members Present: Armando Abrego, Megan Cooper, Norma Garcia, Dr. Yolanda Gorman, Robert Jones, Dr. Nicole Lawson, Amanda Martin, Patricia O'Toole, Keisha Sexton, Dr. Raissa White.

Staff Present: David McNeill, Executive Officer; Gail Krippner, Grant Program Manager; Tiffany Jones, Project Manager; Lena Sheet, Deputy Attorney General.

III. Approval of Minutes (September) – Megan Cooper, Chair

Member Jones provided a motion to approve the minutes. Member Garcias seconded the motion. Executive Director McNeill conducted a roll call vote. With a vote of ten ayes, no nays, the minutes were approved.

IV. Update on the Baldwin Hills Reservoir Revitalization Project – Valerie Clarke, SWA Architects

Valerie Clark from SWA Architects and Emil Tyrer from TreePeople presented a PowerPoint presentation on the status and future plans for the revitalization of the Bowl. Based on the feedback the received from the community, they discussed their plans to strengthen connections to local history, provide more accessibility, increase shade structures and canopy coverage, improve amenities including signage seating and trials, and address the health concerns of local neighbors. They have completed their outreach, created, and shared the feasibility study and outreach report, and shared their concept development phase. Working with the community and other stakeholders, they estimate that their final plans will be completed by Summer 2023, with construction to begin in 2024. In addition, they are working with the Audubon Society on restoration, hosting local schools to educate them on the importance of native species, and holding community events to plant native plants on the hillside.

Member Garcia commented that this project is right in line with what the county parks envisions for the park. She is also dedicated to providing support to develop a signage plan that is integrated into all of the significant improvements. She and her staff would like to work on a CEQA piece, as there are significant improvements that have been made and continue to be made in the park. They want to make sure the county is aware of the budget and construction timeline for the county budget process and to inform the community of any area that may be unavailable.

Member Lawson had questions regarding to what degree an integrated signage plan involves partnering with community organizations and including youth outreach and education. Her second question was regarding how TreePeople defined the community because she and other locals were unaware of TreePeople's outreach efforts. Executive director David McNeill explained how Talia Dotson, TreePeople's Urban Greening Community Organizer, organized and hosted six community engagement meetings they conducted, the tabling and canvassing activities at theaters, swap meets, and farmers markets. She also attended the Empowerment Congress West Area Neighborhood Development Council, a group that works for the local Los Angeles County community. She has gone from Culver City to Crenshaw and the adjacent community and conducted online surveys. Daniel Berger of TreePeople added that they welcome any new constituents and additional input. Chair Cooper asked about the funding source of the project. Executive Director McNeill explained that the BHC is funding the outreach and development concept phase through Prop 68. Once that is completed, the second round of the implementation period, which includes a CEQA analysis schedule for the county budgeting process, will be a four to five-year process.

V. Discussion and possible action on a proposal to amend the membership within the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority Joint Powers Authority Statute by removing the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy and adding the Baldwin Hills Conservancy – David McNeill, Executive Officer

Executive Officer McNeill spoke about a coordinated effort between the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, the Baldwin Hills Conservancy, and the County of Los Angeles to transition the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority (BHRCA). The BHRCA is a Joint Powers Authority formed in 2000 that assists in the acquisition and development of Baldwin Hills, including Milton Street Park, the site of the Stoneview Nature Center, Park to Play and the development of the bridge over La Cienega. There is a quarterly scheduled meeting between conservancy partners and the 2nd district that includes due diligence on the inventory of assets the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority has, a review of a 2021-2022 audit that has been submitted for their books and accounting. There is an existing fund balance of about \$3.3 million available in their account, their land assets include Milton Street Park, parcels adjacent to the soccer fields, and two billboards on streets surrounding the Baldwin Hills area. The Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy and the MRCA currently have two staff members handling agendas, postings, bookkeeping, agreements, invoices, and deposits through September 2023.

The Baldwin hills Conservancy plans on working closely with the existing support staff and identify staff to be trained. Attorney General Leena Sheet has reviewed the agreement along with the Santa Monica Mountains staff, so the state legal review has been completed. The Council for the County of Los Angeles and their park's legal staff have accepted any changes that were made in their direction. The next step is to authorize the Executive Officer to execute the amendment. All parties needed to

agree to the change including the Baldwin Hills Conservancy, the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, and then to the Board of Supervisors agenda which could take two to three months before approval.

Member Sexton asked to whom the new staff person would report. Executive Director McNeill reported that they report to the Baldwin Hills Regional Conservation Authority, either Supervisor Holly Mitchell or Laura Muraida.

Member Lawson provided a motion and Member White seconded the motion. Executive Director McNeill conducted a roll call vote. With a vote of five ayes, no nays, and one abstention, the motion passed.

VI. Discussion and Possible Action on BHC Officer Nominations for the January 2023 Elections – Megan Cooper, Chair

There are three board members eligible to take on the Baldwin Hills Conservation Vice Chair position next year. Member Garcia declined. Member Gorman deferred to the nominee. Member Rascon indicated interest to be the next Vice-Chair.

VII. Discussion and possible action on adopting the proposed BHC Board meeting schedule for 2023 – Nicole Lawson, Vice Chair

Board Chair Lawson led the discussion on the board meeting calendar schedule for 2023 meetings. Member Martin asked that the May 12th, 2023 meeting be moved to the 19th because the Governor's May revision is usually released on May 14th. Because of potential department meetings, there might be low board attendance.

VIII. Executive Officer Report: Legislative, Operations, Project Status and Fiscal updates – BHC Staff Representatives

Project status updates were given by staff member Gail Krippner regarding the status of the HoneyLove apiary at Stoneview Nature Center. The DTSC project for Environmental Oversight is on pause due to using a different contract form. The Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation Green Valley Connection Improvement project is currently being amended for minor scope of work changes. The Five Points Restoration Project by NorthEast Trees is nearing the end of non-native species removal and continuing outreach schedule.

KDI completed the amendment for a term extension and restarted their community advisory meetings. Tree People's grant for the Baldwin Hills Reservoir Revitalization and Restoration plan is conducting outreach through restoration events and community meetings. The outreach schedule is finalized, and the first meeting was held at the end of February. Climate Resolve's Community Resilience and Access plan are completed done with the project and posted their final report.

Director McNeill discussed two new hires starting in the month of January and February. He spoke about the project status report and the expenditures sheet. He also informed the board of the approval of SB1052 for the BHC Expansion. The territory expansion boundary goes below Inglewood into the Hawthorne and Los Angeles Airport area. It also renames the Baldwin Hills Conservancy to the Baldwin Hills and Urban Watersheds Conservancy, also known as the Urban Watershed Conservancy.

Member Garcia asked Director McNeill for the Conservancy staff, County parks staff, and consultants to meet and discuss and possibly provide a Park Needs Assessment plus presentation to the board.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Pursuant to the Ad Hoc Nomination Committee's recommendation, Sara Rascon is hereby presented for nomination to the position of Vice Chair of the Conservancy for 2023.

Background: The Conservancy statute calls for the annual election of officers by the Governing Board (see Attachment #1). Under the guidelines adopted by the Conservancy in 2004, the Nomination Committee provides a nominee recommendation to the Board for the election. The committee's recommendation does not preclude other eligible candidates from being nominated from the floor at the time of the election. Officers must receive a majority vote from a quorum of the sitting members.

Sara has been a designee for the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy since December of 2019 and is currently the Environmental Equity Officer for the Mountains and Recreation Conservation Authority. Over the past three years, Sara has advised on equity and environmental justice policy for the Conservancy, as well as sharing her expertise working on the LA river with LA County Flood Control and the US Army Corps of Engineers. Rascon is committed to public service outside of work and is engaged in the Greater Los Angeles area while serving as an active Board Member of CicLAvia, a delegate to the CA Democratic Party, and also as an appointed Commissioner for the City of Los Angeles, East Area Planning Commission. Her depth of knowledge regarding leadership across multiple municipalities combined with her community engagement expertise will aid in the Conservancy's expanded outreach and partnership efforts.

Recommended Election Protocol

Recommendation: Approve Resolution 23-01, authorizing a grant of Grant of BH UWC Climate Resilience, Wildfire Prevention, Community Access, and Natural Resource Protection Fund of 2021-2022 (BH UWC Climate Resilience Funds), in an amount not to exceed \$150,000, to the California YIMBY Education Fund c/o Streets for All.

Background:

The California YIMBY Education Fund c/o Streets for All has applied for a grant from the BH UWC Climate Resilience, Wildfire Prevention, Community Access, and Natural Resources Protection Fund of 2021-2022 (BH UWC Climate Resilience Funds) for the Ballona Creek Bike Path Extension – Phase II Feasibility Study Project. *See Attachment #1, Grant Application.*

The proposed project will complete a comprehensive feasibility study that will examine and assess the extension of the Ballona Creek bike path from its current terminus, at the Syd Kronenthal Park in Culver City, to the end of the Ballona Creek at the intersection of Venice Blvd and Cochran Ave. A Final Feasibility Study Report will be generated to inform and guide the implementation of a multi-use trail extension design project to connect communities, increase access to the Ballona Creek bike path, and help reduce vehicle miles traveled.

The project will include **Six (6)** key components. <u>I. Site Assessments:</u> Open space opportunities, placemaking potential, survey and base map, right of way, easement assessor and parcel maps, wet and dry utilities, stormwater management, permitting requitements, stormwater capture and treatment, etc. <u>II. Traffic Analysis Studies:</u> Traffic stress analysis, collision analysis public safety benefits, active trip analysis, vehicle miles traveled reduction (VMT), traffic modeling, crossing criteria and treatments, safe routes to school linkages, greenhouse gas reductions (GHG), usage projection, linkage/active

commuting. <u>III. Community Analysis Studies:</u> Equity analysis, disadvantage community vicinity (CalEnviroScreen 2.0), sustainability elements, health and wellness, economic/cost benefit, job creation, outdoor recreation economic activity, public health benefits, arts culture and community asset linkages, open space and park proximity. <u>IV. Engagement & Presentations:</u> Community, Public Agencies, City Council(s), Business Stakeholders, and Client. <u>V. Plan, Renderings and Diagrams:</u> Overall illustrative master plan, enlargement of key areas, illustrative cross sections, perspective renderings, lighting plan, striping and wayfinding plan. <u>VI. Cost Estimates:</u> Cost estimate analyses.

Together, results of the analyses/work completed for the six (6) project components will be published in the Final Feasibility Study Report as the overall deliverable for this proposed project.

The grant application meets the criteria for the BH UWC Climate Resilience Funds based on the following: 1) proposed community access improvements and public engagement; 2) climate resilience elements of greenhouse gas reduction through planned multi-model nonvehicular transportation enhancements; and 3) incorporating water capture and native landscaping to provide natural resource protection opportunities.

The total cost of the proposed Feasibility Study project is estimated at \$430,000. To date, the proposed project has secured and anticipates funding support from:

Through a Direct Grant in the amount of \$150,000, the Conservancy would be providing project matching funds, constituting 34.9% of the total Feasibility Study project budget. If the Grant is approved, the Conservancy's matching funds would ultimately be leveraged to secure funding for the construction and implementation of a Ballona Creek bike path extension informed by the proposed Feasibility Study project.

If the approved, a grant agreement would be executed in Q1, and work on the project would be anticipated to be completed by Q1 of 2024.

We are delighted to submit our application for funding from the Baldwin Hills Conservancy towards our effort to extend the Ballona Creek Bike Path.

1. Need and urgency for the project

Originally constructed in the late 1970's, Phase 1 of the Ballona Creek Bike Path is a 6.7 mile Class 1 path that currently runs along Ballona Creek from Syd Kronenthal Park in Culver City to the Marvin Braude Bike Path (Beach Bike Path) in Marina Del Rey, which further extends south to Redondo Beach. While the existing bike path is used by many, it stops short of where the creek itself ends at Venice and Cochran. The purpose of this project is to complete a feasibility study to extend the bike path East to Venice and Cochran, the first step in actually being able to construct the path extension. The extension, once completed, will:

- Provide a car-free way to get from disadvantaged communities further East to job centers further West
- Incorporate water elements, including enhanced flood control, groundwater augmentation, heat island mitigation, habitat restoration, beautification, and environmental education
- Create a new park at Venice and Cochran
- Provide community spaces throughout the project, including seating and shade along the path

The feasibility study that this grant would fund is the first step towards completing the path extension.

2. Goals and objectives

Making a watershed like Ballona Creek accessible to the community is aligned with the Conservancy's mission to provide recreation, restoration, and protection of wildlife habitat for the public's enjoyment and educational experience. Completing this feasibility study can lead to constructing the multi-use path along the creek. In addition to the water benefits already

mentioned, this will connect the community more to the creek and its habitat, leading to a new generation of advocates that care about preserving our natural environment.

This project will result in a feasibility study that will be the key document needed to provide for future construction grant funding.

3. Site Description

The feasibility study will be used to complete Phase II of the Ballona Creek Bike Path, which proposes to extend the Bike Path approximately 2.3 miles North/East, from Syd Kronenthal Park to the intersection of Cochran Avenue and Venice Boulevard, which is located at the end of the creek. The extension would include new lighting, drought resistant foliage, and a multi use walking/biking path. It will also include a new park at the corner of Venice/Cochran, with a possible connection to another new green space at Venice/Redondo. Lastly, water features will be incorporated into the project, including enhanced flood control, groundwater augmentation, beautification, heat island mitigation, habitat restoration, and environmental education. Specific land ownership will be determined in the feasibility study; the entire project area is within the incorporated areas of the City of Los Angeles and the City of Culver City. The creek also has a LA County Flood Control easement.





The City of Culver City SUPPORTS the initiative to extend the Ballona Creek Bike Path from its current terminus at Syd Kronenthal Park in Culver City, so that it runs from the ocean all the way to Venice Boulevard and Cochran Avenue in Los Angeles. The extension will not only lengthen the bike path itself but also increase the path's connections to other bikeways and streets to offer a safer ride throughout the LA. area. The property under consideration for inclusion in the project is largely unutilized and the improvements would have a dramatic impact.

In a publicly noticed Brown Act compliant meeting of the West Adams Neighborhood Council (WANC) on May 17, 2021, WANC voted in support of the initiative to extend the Ballona Creek bike path from its current terminus at Syd Kronenthal Park in Culver City to Venice and Cochran in Los Angeles. The vote was ten in favor and two in opposition.

A bike path with drought resistant plants, solar powerd lighting, and appropriate street furniture would be a huge improvement for the space.

Lastly, climate change is real and we need to give people safe alternatives to the car. This bike path would help serve as a major east-west corridor and would provide a clean, active, non-car transporta-tion option for people.

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

5. Need for Conservancy Funds

If no funds were available from the Conservancy, the feasibility study would not be able to move forward; if we cannot complete a feasibility study, the project as a whole will not take place, and Ballona Creek between Syd Kronenthal Park and Venice/Cochran would remain inaccessible to the community, and be without all the benefits that the bike path extension would provide.

Recommendation: Approve Resolution 23-02 for adoption of the draft BH UWC Tribal Policy.

Background: Over the past decade, the State of California and the Federal government have adopted a number of executive orders, statutes, guidance documents, and other policy directives intended to improve communications between public agencies and federally- and non-federally recognized California Native American Tribes (Tribes) and to protect Tribal cultural resources.

California is home to the largest number of Tribes in the contiguous United States, with the federal government (through the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA)) currently recognizing 109 California Tribes, and with the State of California (through the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC)) currently acknowledging fifty-five additional California Tribes and tribal communities. Efforts to improve communication and coordination with Tribes include federal and state laws and guidance documents promoting or requiring tribal consultation in local government planning processes (e.g., the preparation and adoption of general plans), and environmental review document practices (e.g., environmental impact analysis under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA)).

On September 19, 2011, Governor Brown issued Executive Order B-10-11, stating "that it is the policy of this Administration that every state agency and department subject to my executive control shall encourage communication and consultation with California Tribes." Under this order, on November 20, 2012, the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) adopted a Tribal Consultation Policy to govern and ensure effective communication and government-to-government consultation between Tribes and CNRA and its constituent departments that are under executive control. The current administration is committed to demonstrating that agencies under CNRA are actively participating in promoting equitable access to indigenous Tribes residing within local watersheds. Accordingly, our agency has been encouraged to adopt a Tribal Policy (see Attachment #1) that will create better relations and active engagement within the BH UWC territory. If adopted, the policy will be published on the conservancy website and implemented by staff during the course of the agency business.

Draft Tribal Policy

Definitions

For purposes of this policy, the following definitions shall apply:

Tribe: Refers to a California Indian tribe

Federally Recognized Tribe: A tribal entity that is recognized as having a government-to-government relationship with the United States; these entities are listed on the Federal Register and the current list is posted on the Governor's Office of the Tribal Advisor's website.

Non-Federally Recognized Indian Tribe: Those tribes that are not federally recognized and are on the list maintained by the Native American Heritage Commission.

California Indian Tribe: Refers to a federally-recognized California Indian Tribe, as listed in the Federal Register. Only in situations involving cultural resources will a non-federally recognized California Native American that is on the list maintained by the Native American Heritage Commission ("NAHC") be included in this definition. The NAHC will provide a list of non-federally recognized California Native American Tribes for each instance.

Tribal Leaders: Refers to elected officials of Indian tribes and their designees.

Tribal Sovereignty: Refers to the unique political status of federally-recognized Indian tribes. Federally-recognized Indian tribes exercise certain jurisdiction and governmental powers over activities and tribal members within their respective territories. Some of these powers are inherent, and some have been delegated by the United States. Existing limitation on tribal sovereignty are defined through acts of Congress, treaties and federal court decisions.

Objective

The purpose of this policy is to ensure effective government-to-government consultation between the Conservancy and tribes and tribal communities regarding the development of policies, programs, projects, plans, property decisions, and

activities (collectively, "activities") that may affect tribal communities. The goal is to promote discussion and consideration of the views of tribes and tribal communities in an effort to resolve concerns of as many parties as possible.

California Native American tribal governments and tribal communities have sovereign authority over their members and territory and a unique relationship with California's resources. California tribes and tribal communities, whether federally recognized or not, have distinct cultural, spiritual, environmental, economic, and public health interests and valuable traditional cultural knowledge about California resources.

The Conservancy is committed to open, inclusive, and regular communication with tribal governments and communities to recognize and understand their needs and interests. The Conservancy will designate a Tribal Liaison to serve as the point of contact for communication and consultation with California Native American tribes to ensure proactive and meaningful consultation. This includes dedicated communication and outreach such as meetings, workshops, and advisory committees. We strive to continue effective collaboration and informed decision-making where all parties share a goal of reaching a decision together in order to:

- Ensure consultation with tribes occurs early in project development and throughout project implementation.
- Ensure tribal concerns are respected and archaeological and cultural resources are protected.
- Seek solutions to state contracting issues that affect the sovereignty of tribes.
- Assist tribes to regain entry to their ancestral lands through access programs.
- Work with tribes to enable traditional stewardship practices on ancestral land.
- Ensure interpretive, stewardship and ecological programs include indigenous leadership, and perspectives.

Process

The Conservancy will seek to identify California indigenous tribes that may be affected by Conservancy activities, and to consult with the affected tribes at a time that allows a reasonable opportunity for tribes to comment and participate. The Conservancy will utilize the contact list from the Governor's Tribal Advisor for federally recognized tribes and the Native American Heritage Commission contact list for non-federally recognized tribes. The Conservancy will seek to disseminate public documents, notices, and information relevant to its activities to affected tribes. Notices will be designed to include sufficient detail of the topic to be discussed to allow tribal leaders an opportunity to fully engage. The Conservancy will identify agency staff, including decision-makers, associated with the activity in question, who can ensure that tribal concerns will be considered.

The Conservancy will seek to conduct meetings, outreach, and workshops at times and locations that facilitate tribal participation. The Conservancy will request information from tribes when conducting research or studies that pertain to or could affect tribal lands or cultural resources. The Conservancy will seek to protect confidential information provided by a tribe, recognizing that the Conservancy is subject to the California Public Records Act.

The Executive Officer of the Conservancy will designate a Tribal Liaison for the Conservancy to serve as the main contact for tribes. The Tribal Liaison will:

- a. Seek to ensure that outreach and consultation occur regularly and consistent with this policy.
- b. Advise the Executive Officer on policy matters relating to tribal affairs.
- c. Participate on the Tribal Liaison Committee of the California Natural Resources Agency, which reviews tribal consultation efforts and opportunities and shares information.
- d. Coordinate: (i) the training of Conservancy staff with regard to tribal affairs; (ii) the work of Regional Tribal Liaisons; and (iii) the Conservancy's tribal communication and consultation efforts.
- e. Maintain the Conservancy's Tribal Contact List.
- f. Respond to inquiries from, and participate in consultations with, Tribes.

The Conservancy will also work with the Native American Heritage Commission to obtain a contact list of tribal representatives of federally recognized and nonfederally recognized California Indian Tribes. The Conservancy will provide to or obtain training for its tribal liaison and other staff, when appropriate, to implement this policy.

Disclaimers

This policy is intended solely for the guidance of employees of the Conservancy. It is not intended, and should not be construed, to define the legal relationship between the Conservancy and California Native American tribes and tribal communities. This policy is not intended to replace or supplant obligations mandated by federal law. The policy defines provisions for improving Conservancy consultation, communication and collaboration with tribes to the extent that a conflict does not exist with applicable law or regulations. This policy is not intended as a regulation, or to create, expand, limit, waive, or interpret any legal rights or obligations.
